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Telling the Story of Passover

As we approach the holiday of Passover, my mind turns to the art of telling the story of Passover. In particular I'm thinking about the methods, the timing, and the layers of how we share the content of the Passover story. For centuries, the primary method we use to tell the story of Passover is through reading the *Haggadah* at the Passover seder. The seder is an ancient ritual, but not that ancient since it was

crafted by the rabbis of the Tannaitic period (approximately 100-300 CE). So how was the story of Passover shared prior to the seder?

We get a hint at the answer by virtue of the fact that the *Haggadah* itself does not retell the story of Passover, rather it is a rabbinic interpretation of six verses in the Torah on what the Israelites would say when they came to the Temple to perform their Passover sacrifices:

And thou shalt speak and say before the LORD thy God: 'A wandering Aramean was my father, and he went down into Egypt, and sojourned there, few in number; and he became there a nation, great, mighty, and populous. And the Egyptians dealt ill with us, and afflicted us, and laid upon us hard bondage. And we cried unto the LORD, the God of our fathers, and the LORD heard our voice, and saw our affliction, and our toil, and our oppression. And the LORD brought us forth out of Egypt with a mighty hand, and with an outstretched arm, and with great terribleness, and with signs, and with wonders. And He hath brought us into this place, and hath given us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. And now, behold, I have brought the first of the fruit of the land, which Thou, O LORD, hast given me.' And thou shalt set it down before the LORD thy God, and worship before the LORD thy God. (Deuteronomy 26:5-10).

Perhaps the reason the rabbis focused the *Haggadah* on interpreting these verses from Deuteronomy instead of telling the story of Passover from Exodus was to keep the continuity of the Passover ritual from one generation to the next. In other words, prior to the seder, Jews would tell the story through performing a sacrifice. Thus, the seder tells the story through the lens of that sacrifice.

While the *Haggadah* retains this rabbinic tradition, there has been a shift in recent decades from simply reading the *Haggadah* in the fashion of our ancient rabbis to telling our own Passover stories. In other words, just like the rabbis adapted the story of the ancient sacrifice to fit their storytelling style, so too do we adapt the rabbis' version to create a meaningful story for ourselves in connection with this beautiful holiday of redemption and freedom.

On April 13th, our congregation will celebrate the second Passover seder as a community. Unfortunately, I will not be able to share this night in person with all of you, but will be joining in by Zoom. The community seder will be in good and capable hands led by **Susan Smoller and David Wasser.** I cannot wait to hear all the good stories about the seder when I return to Torat Yisrael for the conclusion of the Passover holiday (April 18th-20th)!

That Friday night (April 18th), we will build off our seder experiences with a SPECIAL dinner and program that will continue the process started by the Tannaitic rabbis of adapting new ways to tell the story of Passover. Both kinds of storytelling - ancient and modern - are necessary so that the Passover story will continue to be meaningful for generations to come.

Looking forward to seeing you during Passover!

Here we are just a few weeks away from Passover. It's on the minds of most, if not all, of our congregation. During the kiddush after a recent Shabbat morning service, I was listening to a group of friends reminiscing about their families' traditions to prepare for Passover; gathering up the chametz and putting it a cupboard that was tied shut, cleaning kitchen countertops and lining them with aluminum foil, getting out special Passover dishes and utensils, etc. I remembered that I did not grow up with many traditions. I do remember the

family seder on the first night and helping my mother the day before making matzah balls for the chicken soup. I also remember she would make a matzah brei some mornings during the holiday. She would sprinkle sugar and cinnamon, or pour maple syrup, over the matzah brei for breakfast. That is one tradition I have kept. I always make at least one matzah brei for myself every year (Ellie is not a fan of matzah brei).

During the morning service for that Shabbat, Susan Smoller gave a d'var Torah. She spoke about the way the Israelites organized to construct the Mishkan and she likened it to how we at TTY regularly come together to accomplish things for our community. Just this past month, members of the Ways & Means Committee gathered donations for the Comedy Night auction and a raffle that helped make the evening a fundraising success. Some made tasty food and eye-catching desserts. Others made beautiful decorations for the room. Many other community members attended, brought friends, bought raffle tickets and bid on auction items, all contributing to the success of the event.

More recently, members came together to put on this year's Purim Carnival for our children. They baked hamantaschen, set up games and crafts, and staffed stations to ensure our children had a wonderful day. Many members, most with children in the Religious School, but many without, came to support our children and our Education Director as they led a beautiful Friday night Shabbat service. Members also came on a recent Sunday morning to donate blood for a drive organized by Sue Sidel for the Rhode Island Blood Center. The Center was very grateful for the effort. Message from Our New Capital Campaign

Our Capital Campaign is vital for Temple Torat Yisrael's financial future. Our goal is to raise \$1,000,000 to reduce the Temple's mortgage and to build a new Aron Kodesh for our sanctuary. The Aron Kodesh is the focal point of the sanctuary and houses our Torahs. Our Temple is supported by the generosity of our members. Your commitment in perpetuating the Jewish religion and expanding our Jewish community in East Greenwich is the strength of our Temple. Your commitment to the Temple will make our fund raiser achievable.

The Committee continues to reach out to our members. We are over 1/3 toward our Capital Campaign goal from your generosity. Your support to the Campaign is heartwarming.

Besides donating to the Capital Campaign by check, direct transfers to the Temple from one's retirement account may satisfy the donor's required annual minimum distribution. Donations of marketable securities allow the donor to receive a tax deduction at the current fair market value of the donated securities without having to recognize any income tax gain between the original cost of the securities and its fair market value on the date of transfer. Donors of appreciated securities may receive a charitable deduction on their individual income tax return if the amount of their donations exceed the minimum deductible threshold set by the IRS. Even if one is not able to take advantage of a charitable deduction, any gain on the direct transfer to the Temple of marketable securities having a current market value more than their original cost is not recognized by the donor.

Our goal is attainable with your support. Members of the Capital Campaign are reaching out to all the congregants. Please answer their calls, meet with them and hear our need. We need everyone's support to reach our goal. Together we are stronger.

The Gates of Gaza by Amir Tibon

A gripping first-person account of how one Israeli grandfather helped rescue two generations of his family on October 7, 2023—a saga that reveals the deep tensions and systemic failures behind Hamas's attacks that day.

On the morning of October 7, Amir Tibon and his wife were awakened by mortar rounds exploding near their home in Kibbutz Nahal Oz, a progressive Israeli community less than a mile from Gaza City. Soon, they were holding their two young daughters in the family's reinforced safe room, urging them not to cry as gunfire echoed just outside the door. With his cell phone battery running low, Amir texted his father: "The girls are behaving really well, but I'm worried they'll lose patience soon and Hamas will hear us."

Some 45 miles north, Amir's parents had just cut short an early morning swim along the shores of Tel Aviv. Now, they jumped in their Jeep and sped toward Nahal Oz, armed only with a pistol but intent on saving their family at all costs.

In The Gates of Gaza, Amir Tibon tells this harrowing story in full for the first time. He describes his family's ordeal and the bravery that ultimately led to their rescue—alongside the histories of the place they call home and the systems of power that have kept them and their neighbors in Gaza in harm's way for decades.

Woven throughout is Tibon's own expertise as a longtime international correspondent, as well as more than thirty original interviews: with residents of his kibbutz, with the Israeli soldiers who helped to wrest it from the hands of Hamas, and with experts on Gaza, the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, and the failed peace process. More than one family's odyssey, The Gates of Gaza is the intimate story of a tight-knit community and the broader saga of war, occupation, and hostility between two national movements—a conflict that has not yet extinguished the enduring hope for peace.

Exciting Mitzvah project for IDf!

Frederic G. & lawrence G. Cohen Educational Scholarship Eligibility & Criteria

Torat Yisrael provides scholarships for post-secondary education to members of Temple Torat Yisrael (TTY). In order to apply, parents must be a current member in good standing of TTY for at least 5 prior years and also be a current member in good standing for at least 5 years with TTY's Men's Club and/or Sisterhood. The applicant shall write a 2-page criteria statement of their commitment to Judaism as well as submit 3 reference letters and a financial award letter from the college they are attending showing total cost of enrollment. Applications will be judged and chosen with several factors being taken into consideration.
